



Risk Management Standards Workshop

Who should attend?

Anyone who is expected to know about Risk Management standards, whether a member of a board risk committee or a risk management practitioner in an enterprise needs to keep up to date on this subject.

This course is really aimed at anyone who feels that they ought to know about risk management standards. Their current level of knowledge is unlikely to be important since there has been so much change over the last twelve months. Anyone who is unable to sit down and read all of the relevant standards, and who thinks they might be asked to opine on such matters should attend.

What is covered?

We will cover the broad sweep of risk management standards that are emerging, compare and contrast similarities and differences and look at how easy they might be to implement. We will explore any compliance requirements, and whether there are any benefits to claiming compliance. We will also look at possible future developments.

Benefits of attending

Those who attend will have a good overview of the current state of global and domestic risk management standards, and will have a clear view as to whether there is anything in them for their enterprise. They will be able to explain to others which (if any) their organisation should follow and how to go about it. They will also be able to explain the pros and cons of complying with any given standard.

Course presenter

Richard Anderson is both a member of the IRM, and a Chartered Accountant. He is a former partner at PwC where he led the Strategic Risk Services practice in EMEA. He now runs his own governance, risk management and assurance practice. He has a particular interest in matters relating to ERM and how that fits with Corporate Governance, hence his interest in risk management standards. He recently wrote a report on Corporate Risk Management which addresses these topics for the OECD. He is currently the lead examiner for module 1 (Principles of Risk) and for the specialist module on Corporate Governance for the international diploma. Richard is also a member of the BSi committee that produced BS31100, so is well versed in the detail.
